Yash Pincha had the unique privilege of taking part in the 48th iteration of Yale Model United Nations in a 40-hour long conference that lasted for 4 days from January 20th to January 23rd, 2022. The YMUN is one of the largest conferences conducted globally and is specifically limited to delegates who have showcased exemplary achievement in both academics and MUNs. Over the course of four days, delegates passed dozens of resolutions, addressing a range of issues. He had the opportunity to

learn from Yale students in interactive workshops, watch thought-provoking lectures taught by Yale professors, and engage in virtual events.

Ever want to teleport to a fictional world even though it is incredibly deadly? This book made me want to do precisely that! Every time I read through the synopsis, chills run down my spine! The Rise Of Nine is the third book in the series Lorien Legacies by Pittacus Lore, published back in 2012. The Lorien Legacies series is a young adult teen fiction novel. It revolves primarily around an alien invasion on our planet combated by a group of seemingly harmless teenagers (there's so many of them that it's often challenging to pick your favourite).

Due to its utter underratedness, I found the series quite late but was hooked onto it for the foreseeable future instantly. Plot and Setting:

The first half of the story takes place in the city of Ketterdam, the capital of Kerch, known for its trade and crime. This book is part of Bardugo's Grishaverse series, and in this world, there are people with magical powers who are known as the Grisha. There are many types of Grisha, an example being the Heartrender. They are capable of slowing down or speeding up someone's heart rate.

The plot follows 17-year-old criminal mastermind Kaz Brekker as he assembles a team (known as The Crows) to break out the creator of a deadly drug, jurda parem, that could affect the world of Grisha magic forever, in exchange for thirty million kruge (the currency of Kerch). The first two chapters dragged on, and I felt uninterested. However once the story started picking up, I was completely hooked. The plot never slowed down and always kept me engaged and curious about what was going to happen next.

Characters:

The characters were all very unique and distinguishable from one another with distinctive personalities and back stories.

Kaz Brekker:

Known as Dirtyhands, Kaz Brekker is the manipulative criminal mastermind, second in command of the Dregs gang, and leader of the Crows. He will do anything for anyone, for the right price, and is willing to do whatever it takes to achieve his goals. His most distinctive feature is his limp, for which he uses a cane with a crow head atop it to help him walk around. Occasionally, this cane also gets used as a weapon. He is calculating, ruthless, and always has a trick up his sleeve.

Inej Ghafa:

Kaz's 16-year-old right hand who is known as the Wraith. She can move stealthily, almost silently on all surfaces, and spies for the Dregs. Her specialty is knives, which she is incredibly skilled at using. Inej is reserved and always listening, and will show kindness when necessary.

Jesper Fahey:

A 17-year-old member of the Dregs and skilled sharpshooter. He has a gambling problem. Jesper is sarcastic and loves testing his odds. He is also very impulsive, which leads him to feel guilty due to his actions.

Nina Zenik:

A 17-year-old Grisha Heartrender whom Kaz enlists to help him on the mission. Nina is the most carefree of the bunch and is bold, loud, and unafraid to share her opinion. She loves her friends sincerely and also loves to enjoy different foods, especially sweets. She is also very loyal to her home country of Ravka. She is my favourite character.

Matthias Helvar: An 18-year-old convict who became rageful and cold during his year in prison. He hails from Fjerda, and is, at first, ashamed of himself for breaking into the Ice Court in his home country. He feels as though he is a traitor. But as the story progresses, he comes to care for the other crows and puts their protection above all else.

Wylan:

A 16-year-old runaway with a privileged past. He is skilled at music, art, maths, and also has some knowledge of demolition. He is kind, quiet, and shy, and does not share his opinion unless asked. However, he becomes a bit more confident as the story goes on.

The book is very diverse in many areas such as disabilities, race and racism, and LGBTQ+ representation. Trauma is also handled very well and is given proper understanding and never made

fun of. The bonds and dynamics the characters had with each other were, to me, the best part and made this book all the more entertaining.

Overall thoughts:

Overall, I think Six of Crows is a phenomenal book that is worth reading for the characters alone. The world is written in rich detail, the plot doesn't slow down and the characters are never boring. If you like heists, violence, found families, and fantasy, I think Six of Crows is a must-read for you. I recommend it for people ages 13 and up. I give it a 5/5.



The programme concluded with a presentation on 'contributions of Ramanujan' by Aarna Karnani. The children were overwhelmed with the various fascinating numbers and the mathematics they find in nature.

For Grade 8 and 9 celebrations, Arthi of Grade 9 spoke about the contributions of Srinivasa Ramanujan. Krti of Grade 8 presented on Platonic solids and their nets and Agneyan on the Euler's formula. Following this, there was a demonstration by Vyas on fallacies in Maths and a power-point on the game of life. Aarohi explained about the Napiers' device used for multiplication.

Arthi and Vishakha of Grade 9 presented on the fascinating Golden Ratio and the Fibonacci sequences. They were supported by Mehr, Aananditha, Samyuktha and Aiswarya. teachers and the girl students of Grade IB1, IB2, 11 and 12.






fervour.

A SESSION ON GUIDELINES TO DEVELOPA RESEARCH IDEA

A session on Guidelines to Develop a Research Idea was organised for Grade 10, IB1 and members of staff on Saturday, 5th January in Google Meet. Ms. Lakshmi Shankar Iyer, Head of Specialisation - Business Analytics, School of Business and Management, Christ University, Bangalore presided over the session.

The session commenced with a welcome note by Ms. Deepa, IBDP Asst. Coordinator. Ms. Lakshmi spoke on the importance of research in academia and industry and the need to map the demand for such research in industry by supply from academia.



The primary aspect while taking on research is the curiosity to understand and learn new things in every field. According to her, whenever we look for an idea, the question arises whether we should find something in google search and take it or is it important for us to conduct a novel investigation ourselves. However, she stressed on the need to identify an appropriate topic as the future career of a student would likely depend on his/her research topic.

She elaborated on three aspects to develop a research idea, namely, contemporary, novel and creative. Novelty could be what you can introduce to an existing research idea even if the research of the topic has already been done. Creativity could be the pathbreaking solutions your research can lead to and contemporary could be mapping your research ideas to solving the contemporary problems in society.

She detailed the need to narrow down the topic of research and choose one where data collection could be feasible during the research. Ideas could germinate from articles and editorials from newspapers, TV debates etc. White papers in govt. websites could also help in ideation.

Literary students must read around 50 research literary reviews before they embark on a research topic.

The session also included the importance of students being able to envision at least 50% of their research outcome before they submit a research proposal. Gaps are likely to occur when there are existing theories which have no solutions. Research gap happen when there are existing theories for which they can't find solutions. She also emphasised the need for research areas to track the marketing aspects for ensuring customer experience.

What followed was a Q&A session where questions were posed on researching on varied topics such as how to use an already researched topic without resorting to plagiarism, conducting a good research, genuinity in research and access to online research libraries and white papers.

The session concluded with a vote of thanks by Anaika from Grade IB1. Overall, it was very qualitative and a need-of-the-hour for the Grade IB1 batch.

INVESTITURE CEREMONY


The Head of School, in her speech, applauded the students for their enthusiasm and reiterated the importance of sports.


The students were also shown snippets of the investiture ceremony held the previous day and the programme concluded with a vote of thanks by Arnav of Grade 6 and national anthem.
